MEET THE ARTISTS

JOE DARRO

Guest performer on December 15, 2019 for the LVJS Holiday Party at the Bootlegger series.



Joe is a much-admired musician and singer, not only by audiences, but also amongst his peers.

Born in Albany, New York, He learned his craft in many of the area's better nightspots. He joined Bobby Sherwood's traveling group in 1960 and remained with him for twelve years, appearing nationwide in top hotels and clubs.

Joe has had successful engagements in nearly every Nevada resort and casino, experience he put to use when he moved to Atlanta in 1972. For the next six years he worked the upper Atlanta clubs with his own group and added television to his repertoire, appearing on the popular "AM Atlanta." He returned to Las Vegas in 1978, where he has been working regularly both as a single and with a choice selection of local groups.

Over his career, Joe Darro has appeared with the likes of: Vic Damone, Shecky Greene, Frank Sinatra Jr., Sammy Davis Jr., Louis Prima, Kenny Rogers, Jack Jones, Joe Williams, The Four Freshmen, Mickey Rooney, The Smothers Brothers, Debbie Reynolds, and a host more. He worked for Debbie Reynolds Hotel for four years as Musical Director for a weekly television show, which originated from Debbie's hotel and was hosted by comedian Pete Barbutti. He was selected to open the Bellagio Hotel in October of 1998.

Joe is currently working on his legacy album for release in the spring of 2020. "Joe Darro Swings" will feature Joe's incredible jazz improvisational scatting, mind-boggling range, smooth ballad vocals (the likes of Mel Torme and Ella Fitzgerald) as well as piano stylings.

Carlos Mata-Alvarez is a professional composer/arranger, saxophone and woodwind player currently residing in Las Vegas.

Jazz Society (JS): What made you choose the saxophone as your main instrument?

Carlos Mata-Alvarez: When entering 6th grade, my parents had signed me up for band. We had an instrument test drive and my first choice was trumpet. Unfortunately, my teeth were a bit askew at the time and I was going to get braces later that year. The band director advised me not to play a brass instrument, so we ended up going with my second choice, the alto saxophone.

JS: Who are some of your musical influences?

CMA: Lately, I have been diving into more video game scores checking out composers like Toby Fox, Winifred Phillips, Steven Melin, Manaka Kataoka, and of course legends like Koji Kondo, David Wise, and Junichi Masuda. I've been oddly obsessed with how music was programmed for early systems for the Nintendo, Game Boy, Super Nintendo, Sega Genesis, N64 and more. I am currently in the ending stages of an album of all original 8bit music called "8-Bit Adventure, Video Game Music Vol. 1," look out for that later next year.

JS: Tell is about your group, The M&M Nonet.

CMA: The M&M nonet is a group led by composer/trumpet artist, Jorge Machain and me. We were interested in forming our own horn group to write for and came up with the idea of an orchestration inspired by Miles Davis/Gil Evans' "Birth of the Cool." We thought the 6 horns, (alto and baritone saxes, trumpet, french horn, trombone, and tuba) would be an interesting sound to create arrangements and original music for. Jorge and I are fans of classical music/orchestration and we liked the addition of the french horn and tuba for a warm and silky thirdstream sound, combined with the flute/clarinet doubling on the alto and baritone chairs. We also had certain players in mind when creating the group, like trombonist and UNLV Jazz Faculty member, Nathan Tanouye, whom we regularly feature as a soloist on our pieces, as well as our baritone sax player from New York, Mat Shumer, who just plain rips. We have recently recorded an album which pays homage to the original "Birth of the Cool" record



which may be released in the later part of 2020.

JS: As a UNLV Jazz Graduate, what skills did you get from UNLV that shaped you to be the musician you are today?

CMA: I was very fortunate to study at UNLV. I first met Dave Loeb when he was the director of the CCSD Honor Jazz Bands during my junior and senior years of high school. Through these district bands I was able to form a relationship with him and he recruited me to UNLV's jazz program. He always pushed the saxophone players to play doubles, so my senior year in the Honor Band he chose an arrangement of "Oleo" with a piccolo part for me to play. Throughout my undergrad he always pushed me to take lessons on clarinet and flute, transcribe, write/arrange and to always make sight-reading a priority. I even went to see him play at Fox Studios in LA, recording music for episodes of "Family Guy" and "The Cleveland Show." I also got to hear/see some of the best woodwind doublers in the world and meet world class composers, orchestrators and producers. In addition to Dave, I had the pleasure of working with Celine Dion's trombonist/orchestrator, Nathan Tanouye. He taught me a lot of the basics of arranging and orchestrating. I was not a composition/arranging major, but he always took time out of his busy schedule to look at my work and give me pointers. Every year we also got to record a CD in the studio including some of my original big band and studio orchestra pieces. I also served as an Associate Producer on two of the CD's which was an invaluable experience. Working with the Latin Ensemble instructor, Uli Geissendoerfer, was a huge contrast, but one I needed. While Dave and Nathan focused more on the commercial aspects of music, Uli always brought the most creativity out of his students and ensembles. In addition, he is the curator of the main jazz club in town, "The Dispensary Lounge," which is where I spent a lot of time on the weekends hanging out, sitting in, and learning. He put together some of the best musicians in town for monthly jam sessions, and killer trios on the weekends with diverse, creative vocalists. Lastly, being surrounded by such talented classmates was very inspiring day to day. Jason Corpuz, Jorge Machain, Julian Tanaka, John Summers, to name a few...were essential in pushing me to be better. These skills, community, and opportunities helped shape me into the musician I am today.

JS: You studied at the Frost School of Music for composition and have been commissioned to write

numerous pieces. Can you describe your writing process?

CMA: It depends on the project. I would say most of my ideas come from singing or at the piano. Sometimes I write a song in one sitting and other times it takes me four or five sessions. I tend to have a hard time coming up with ideas if I'm not given a subject matter for a piece. I also like to try different styles of composition. Sometimes I even make games out of some of my creative pieces or just imitate something I really like, but in my own way. Sometimes I notate the music and sometimes I play/record directly into a DAW. I've also been trying to be more open to collaboration on pieces, I think this concept can bring music to a whole other level than if you tried to control everything yourself. Overall, I like my music to have a story or deeper meaning.

JS: You were just featured with the Henderson Symphony Orchestra on September 20th under the direction of Alexandra Arrieche. Tell us more about this interesting piece of music and your part in it.

CMA: Yes, Mason Bates' "Mothership." A very exciting piece which features four improvising soloists along with an electronic DJ. I always have fun playing with a full-size orchestra. The ensemble is so dynamic with lots of textures and colors, which inspires me.

JS: You recently played at The Dispensary Lounge with the Nevada School of the Arts Staff. Tell us about the NSA and what you do as staff member.

CMA: I joined the faculty this year as a jazz instructor. I am honored to be among such a fantastic faculty, working with young middle school and high school students who are eager to learn about the jazz tradition. The class meets Wednesday after school and we talk about jazz history and break off into combos to work up some tunes for the performances and monthly jam sessions. We also have incredible guest artists come in such as Peter Erskine and John Beasley. Jazz @ NSA is run by artistic advisor Justin DiCioccio and program director Adam Schroeder. We often do masterclasses/concerts for schools in the CCSD district and beyond. I look forward to the rest of the year.

JS: Do you have any gigs/performances that we can look forward to in November/ December?

CMA: I will be performing with my jazz quartet at The Dispensary Lounge on November 20th. I 'm also a regular sub on keyboard and saxophones at "Vegas! The Show" at Planet Hollywood, which runs seven nights a week. On November 6th, you can catch me performing with the popular DJ Group from Los Angeles, "Two Friends," at the XS Nightclub at the Wynn. I will also be performing with the

UNLV Jazz faculty for their Jazz Festival on December 4th at the Black Box Theatre. NSA Jazz faculty and students will be at the E-String November 3rd and December 8th, in addition to a performance at NSA downtown on December 18th.

I also want to add that I am releasing my debut album "Miami Qtet" (yes, I'm working on three albums at once) sometime early next year (probably February 2020) featuring some incredible musicians from Miami, Florida. I just finished the mixing and mastering, and am working with a fantastic artist, Mackenzie Karbon on the album artwork. This album will include 10 tracks of all original jazz music with some special guests including saxophonist Tom Kelley and vocalist Gary Fowler. I will have physical copies for sale at my shows next year and it will be available to stream as well.



REMEMBERING AND REFLECTING...

Pianist, RONNIE SIMONE passed away on October 7, 2019. He was 84.

He is remembered here by Frank Leone.



My dear friend, Ronnie Simone, was the consummate pianist, encompassing every aspect of music. He was born June 6, 1935, in New Haven, CT, into a musical family. His father was a

professional bass player for symphonic music and theatrical musicals. Ronnie took to the piano like a bee takes to a blossom; he also possessed perfect-pitch. He was of extreme intelligence, completing his education at Yale University, where he studied the with eminent pianist, Donald Currier, achieving a BA and MA in Music.

Ron, from the age of 13 played in local New Haven orchestras and venues. He gained valuable experience playing shows at East Coast summer resorts such as Lake Placid and Lake George, NY. After college, Ron became an accompanist, rehearsal, and audition pianist for countless singers in NYC, where he also jobbed with the Lester Lanin Orchestra. Further experience included touring with the Ice Follies, cruise ships, and ultimately a road gig with the Sammy Kaye orchestra. After moving to Las Vegas in 1960, he became pianist for the Broadway show, La Plume de Ma Tante and shows to follow, Gypsy, Irma la Duce, Bye Bye Birdie, among others. He was chief rehearsal pianist for both the Tropicana and Dunes Hotels, where he also wrote much of the music for the two production shows: Casino de Paris and Folies Bergere, writing its spectacular Can-Can, which played for 42 years. He was a superb sightreader for both commercial and classical music,

accompanying hundreds of performers of all genres; classical, popular, Broadway, jazz, and many ethnicities. He quickly and easily earned the appreciation and respect of the Las Vegas musical community.

After joining his old New York violinist friend, Joe Mack (Macchiaverna), in the Desert Inn Monte Carlo gourmet restaurant, they became the premier duo in town with a repertoire of thousands of continental songs. Ron later joined the Johnny Haig Relief Orchestra, for many years playing the regular house orchestra's "night-off" for several hotel-casinos, having to play that week's music for all those shows' stars; it was the hardest gig in town!

It must not be overlooked that Ron repeatedly won election to the Board of Musicians Union of Las Vegas, Local 369, AFM, where on the Board and various Local 369 committees, his superb intelligence contributed mightily to the success of our local during the 16 years I served as its president.

After forty-three straight years on the "Strip," Ron "cherry picked" jobs as he preferred. He also enjoyed weekly Friday morning sessions with a group of retired musician friends, playing for fun, music they liked.

To say he will be missed, whether personally or professionally, would be a massive understatement. There was nobody like him. As a pianist, myself, taking the liberty of speaking for the pianists of our city, I can easily say; he was the greatest of us!

Ardent jazz supporter, GEORGE G. WEST died September 15, 2019, just short of his 92nd birthday.



A former musician, George joined the Musician's Union in his sophomore year of high school at age 14 and formed a small dance band which within a 2-year span became the George West Big Band, playing at colleges, universities, and ballrooms in and around the Des Moines area.

He joined the Naval Reserve and was recruited by the U.S. Army in 1951, serving in Okinawa until 1953. He was appointed Assistant Attorney General for the state of Iowa in 1954, practiced law for many years, formed Clark & West Realty, was the premier educator for licensing of real estate appraisers, published two manuals and lectured across the US and Puerto Rico. He was

one of the first "certified" real estate appraisers in the US.

Most of all he loved music and visited Las Vegas countless times before moving here. He was a recognizable figure at most of the Jazz venues, regaling one and all with his extensive musical knowledge and interesting stories. May he REST IN PEACE.





JAZZTIMES

This two-CD set from UNLV's jazz program features five distinct performance groups that explore a wide variety of music. Disc One includes eight tracks by Jazz Ensemble I and closes with three from the Honors Quartet. Bill Cunliffe's arrangement of Leonard Bernstein's "West Side Story" medley is a robust showcase for the ensemble. It's also the first of many spotlights for the pianist, composer, and arranger Patrick Hogan, whose solo blends moments of delicacy and authority. Later in the big band program, Hogan shares his vocal talent on his arrangement of "Tenderly."

JEI's co-director Nathan Tanouye arranged two Russ Freeman compositions for the big band. The salsa flavored "Maid in Mexico" features Jorge Machain on trumpet and Bennett Mason on piano, while the rollicking "Russ Job" spotlights Jeymar Perez on alto saxophone and Amy Crosley on drums. Herbie Hancock's "Tell Me a Bedtime Story," arranged by Mason, is a beautiful change of pace, featuring Machain on flugelhorn and Filip Rodriguez on tenor sax. The title track, "Passersby," is a buoyant Hogan original that sounds like a Pink Panther-ish natural for an up-tempo TV soundtrack. It features Perez, trombonist Giovanni Lacala, and Machain's blistering trumpet. UNLV's Honors Quartet teams Hogan with Machen, bassist Molly Redfield, and drummer Angelo Stokes. These players have great chemistry as they dig into Redfield's swinging arrangement of a Ray Brown tribute, "Ray's Kicks," the pianist's own "Life and Times," and Machain's arrangement of the standard "I Hear a Rhapsody," a subtler trumpet showcase.

UNLV's Latin Jazz ensemble put an Afro-Cuban twist on six jazz, latin, pop, and rock tunes to open Disc Two. There's a supercharged 5/8 arrangement of John Coltrane's "Naima" by percussionist Zach Meja-Guzman that features violinist Peter Goomroyan and pianist Mason.

Carlos Henriques "2/3's Adventure" blends clave, montuno, and swing, highlighted by Daniel Egwurube's flute work. Joe Henderson's "Caribbean Firedance" was arranged by Julian Tanaka as an intricate showcase for the group's horn section and percussionist. The Latin groups three pop and rock covers are quite diverse. Jesus Munoz arranged the Mars Volta's "L'Via L'Viaquez"—and plays the Cuban tres, a guitar with three courses of doubled strings, on it. There's also a spirited take on Ariana Grande's "NASA," a double time samba arranged by drummer Michael Hoffman. Bass trombonists Alan Cates arranged the bands cover of Joe Jackson's 1984 pop hit "Cha Cha Loca" that features flutist Egwurube and guitarist Samuel Ramirez.

UNLV's Contemporary Jazz Ensemble performs two very different tunes: Bud Powell's "Elogie" from his Strictly Powell Blue Note session and an extended exploration of Bill Chase's "Weird Song #1,". Both feature violinist Goomroyan. With her wordless vocals, Angelica Hachiya becomes another member of the horn section.

Hogan arranged the the tracks from the Honors Trio, in which he teams with bassist Rubin Van-Gundy and drummer Hoffman. Richard Rodger's "Blue Room," gets an edgy treatment, Learner and Loewe's "On The Street Where You Live" is an extended feature for piano and bass, and there's a hornless take on the Randy Hall-Vincent Willburn III ballad "The Man With The Horn," written for Miles Davis. This version, featuring Hogan on piano is a gem.
